# General Rules



## Position Papers:

Ad Hoc differs from a regular crisis committee; position papers are NOT required, as the information regarding the topic of crisis and individual position is withheld until the day of. Please do not submit anything.

## Electronic Aids:

Electronics may only be used for the writing of working papers or as a translation tool and are prohibited for notes. As this is an Ad Hoc committee, you will not have any notes. If you need a copy of the ROP or crisis rules then you must print them out.

## Delegate Conduct:

All delegates will be held to a professional standard; delegates must be respectful to all staff, other delegates, and sponsor teachers. During committee delegates must use appropriate diplomatic language, abstain from profanity, and any other inappropriate behaviour.

English will be the only official working language of this conference. We request that delegates refrain from the use of any accents not native to them. The conference dress code will be western business casual.

Delegates who disregard these rules shall be called to order right away by the chair. It is advised that delegates who believe they are not receiving respectful treatment speak with their Director or a Secretariat representative about their concerns.

Roll call will be held at the start of each planned committee meeting, and delegates are expected to be present. Delegates should notify their committee staff verbally or by email if they will be absent for all or a portion of a committee meeting.

## General Powers Of The Secretariat:

These regulations may be suspended or changed at any moment by the Secretary-General and other Secretariat personnel. Furthermore, Secretariat employees are permitted to be Committee Staff members and may invite any speaker to address the committee.

## General Powers Of The Staff:

The staff, or the Dais, is the final authority within the committee. They are capable of suspending or amending the Rules of Procedure when necessary, and are able to interrupt the flow of debate to rule any action dilatory for the progress of the committee.

# Flow of Debate



## Caucuses

Delegates do not set an agenda or motion for the moderated caucuses. It is instead a perpetual moderated caucus that lasts indefinitely, where delegates can raise their placard to give speeches. The topic all depends on what the delegates focus on.

There is an exception to not being able to set agendas or motions; delegates may motion for an unmoderated caucus. Unmoderated caucuses can be beneficial to informally coordinate with your allies and figure out directions and future motives, though they can be ruled dilatory by the Chair.

## Right of Reply

As delegates are the ones controlling where the debate goes, they can either focus on the crisis at hand, or try to jokingly slander another country. If the slander becomes personal or impugns national integrity, then the delegate who is being slandered may have permission for a right of reply.

## Point of Order

A delegate may raise their placard to mention a Point of Order, which serves the purpose of informing the Chair of an error in the execution of the Rules of procedure. A delegate may not interrupt another delegate currently speaking, and may not speak about the substance that is currently under discussion.

## Point of Personal Privilege

A delegate may raise their placard to mention a Point of Personal Privilege, which is specifically aimed to address the personal comfort of said delegate. If the room temperature is too hot, or if the delegate is unable to hear the speaker, then they may raise this point to address these external physical circumstances. These are not necessary to use the washroom, as you can get up and go use them.

## Point of Inquiry

A delegate may raise their placard to mention a Point of Inquiry, which addresses any aspect of uncertainty they may have during the conference. Examples include what the topic addresses, or general information around the conference. Delegates should wait for the current speaker to finish before raising.

# Directives



## × | Directives | ×

Instead of resolution papers, the conference has constant actions being conducted by countries by note. These directives affect the flow of the conference, being able to influence the crisis as a whole. It is essential that directives are written, as it allows the conference to progress and continue. There are two types of directives.

### ◀ Public ▶

Public directives involve the whole committee, and are voted on by the collective of representatives present at the conference. They require sponsors, who are the people that write the directive and directly endorse what it offers. Then there are signatories, who are the delegates who sign the directive so that it may be presented. A minimum of 3 signatories is required. The format of a public directive should contain the name of the assigned representation, the plan, and the predicted outcome. The more elaborate a public directive is, the less likely it will fail not just by vote but by occurrence. If a directive lacks in planning, then it can easily fail in outcome even though the committee passed it, often causing unforeseen consequences.

### ≡ Private ≡

Private directives do not require signatories, and can only affect the internal state of the country passing the directive. Private directives include the name of the delegates assigned representation, the name of the directive, and have to mention the process with the intended outcome. Similar to a public directive, the more elaborate the private directive is, the less likely it will backfire and exacerbate the crisis. The dais will try and find loopholes in these directives. A private directive can also be ruled dilatory by the dais without informing the delegate.

Name: Shibuya Incident

Public Directive

Sponsors: Kenjaku, Mahito

Signatories: Jogo, Hanami, Choso Kamo

Plan: On October 31, 2018, citizens will be trapped with the goal to seal Gojo. A veil will be cast where non-sorcerers are unable to leave, and to also cut connection to the outside world. The Prison Realm will be utilised to properly seal Gojo. Along with the image of Geto that Kenjaku possesses, this can bypass the mental minute that is needed in order for the Prison realm to seal somebody.
